How Do AR and VR Help You Shop Better Online?

Since the outbreak of the Covid-19 pandemic, shopping online has become the new normal. Just in 2020, Amazon has made US\$96.1 billion. Even so, the return rate of Amazon reached an estimated US\$550 million in the same year. People return things they buy for many reasons. They might get the wrong items or the products might be damaged. Maybe, it is simply because the customers don't need the products anymore. How can merchants stop people from returning products, keep their profits and satisfy the customer? AR and VR are here to save the day.



People may know about AR and VR, but what exactly do they stand for? AR stands for augmented reality. It is an image produced by a computer that is used together with a view in the real world. VR stands for virtual reality. The image and sound are produced by the computer and it represents a situation a person can take part in. With AR and VR, customers can shop more easily online.

Here comes the question: How exactly do AR and VR help people shop better? Let's take EyeBuyDirect as an example. It's an online store which sells all kinds of glasses. It offers virtual-try-on using AR and VR technology. You can upload your photo and see how each pair of glasses looks on your face to choose the best option for you. In addition to EyeBuyDirect, Quaytech is a company which develops virtual-try-on apps for merchants and customers. The customers can scan their feet, body, or faces so they can "try on" products online before they make their purchases. The technology helps merchants increase their conversion rate and decrease their return rate.

Then, you can stay safe and healthy and try on products at home without having to visit a regular store. Causative verbs are the verbs that are used to talk about an action that is done by someone else. The speaker is responsible for the action. Common causative verbs are: *have*, *get*, *make*, and *let*. However, they differ in meanings when you use them.

Causative Verb	Form	Meaning & Example
have	S. + <i>have</i> + person + simple verb	To authorize someone to do something: I'll <i>have</i> Ted show you the library.
get	S. + <i>get</i> + person + to + verb	To persuade someone to do something: Anna <i>gets</i> Lynn to go to the party with her.
make	S. + <i>make</i> + person + simple verb	To ask or force someone to do something: John always <i>makes</i> me pay when we eat out.
let	S. + <i>let</i> + person + simple verb	To allow someone to do something: My mother never <i>lets</i> me watch horror movies.
